During one worship service in the month of October 2010, the Lord impressed upon both Aunty Poh Chean and myself that the Chomthong missions team 2010 would serve as "Torch-Bearers" on the field. Our mission was clear – to catch the flames of revival from PLMC and bring it across the seas to Thailand, then hand over the 'torch' of God's radiant glory to show the people that the Kingdom of Christ reigns.

During the nine days that the team came together, we were indeed blessed to be that catalyst to multiple groups of people whom we came into contact with, stirring a deep, God-focussed spiritual hunger. Our entire experience was nothing short of spectacular and amazing as each of us witnessed personally the indescribably tremendous love that God has for the people of Thailand. We were just in awe of how God chose to manifest such love, as event after event the Holy Spirit convicted hearts of pre-believers, healed and restored the sick and broken-hearted while instilling a renewed excitement

for the Lord in the minority Christian community. Nonetheless, despite all the impressive displays, each member of the team came to realise that God is also very much interested in us, and was continuously moulding us through this missions trip. We too were touched on numerous occasions by the Lord as we allowed Him to assume control of our ministry outreaches to the masses, our relationships with one another, and right down to our very own personal choices.

We were blessed to have our missionary contacts; Ajarn Jeph and Apple, together with their two children, join us throughout the nine days. The presence of the entire family gave an added dimension to our ministry outreach. Hope Ministry, which is managed by the couple, became the platform from which our team was able to be a blessing to many others while at the same time learning more about the concept of missions. Through the good relationships that our missionaries have forged with various tribal villages, the gospel can now be shared through 'open doors' to once 'resistant' communities. Hence, Hope Ministry, which encompasses Hope House, has been successful in evangelising, disciplining and planting new house churches in the villages and even schools. It was through the network of friends and relationships that Jeph and

Apple had established in the last decade that allowed our team to gain entry into the homes of tribal villagers, government schools and to Hope House. The Lord



also further complemented the team with three individuals during different periods of our trip, Ajarn Jiraphong, Ajarn Ne Waa and Bebe. Each of them was passionate about serving God and we were grateful to partner them.

Hope House is a Tribal Children's Home in the Chomthong Provincial District, a two-hour drive from Chiang Mai. Hope House takes in tribal children from the remote mountain villages and whose parents are eager to send their children to school but lack the resources to do so. Hope House, managed by Jeph and Apple, is a place of nurture, meeting both the physical and emotional needs of the children as well as imparting spiritual training to enable them to grow in Christ. Situated in a safe environment, the children learn how to pray while being encouraged to read the Bible and practice their faith in everyday life. Now, the children are able to benefit from living close to quality Thai schools and acquire skills, allowing them to avoid the unfortunate consequences of prostitution, child labour and exploitation in Thailand.

There were certainly many great things that occurred; but if I had to highlight one event that proved to be the most memorable of all, it would have to be the time of worship and intercession the team had on the second day, in the village of Nong Lom. Far from being just another regular afternoon, we were gathered in the village chapel and experienced a very intimate encounter with the Holy Spirit. As we worshipped, we mindfully 'pressed in' for a greater portion of His divine presence and for His kingdom to be established in the unreached tribal villages of Northern Thailand. Many of us, including myself, broke into new songs of praise, and found ourselves on our knees and with tears in our eyes asking for the Lord's mercy and blessings to befall on this land. Our prayer that day was, "As we intercede for the tribal people, break our hearts for what breaks yours, Lord", and in return the Lord gave us a heart of compassion for His lost people. The spiritual encounter was so great that every single person in that chapel undeniably felt His sweet anointing just flowing within that place and radiating outwards into the community. After the session, we shared insights that the Holy Spirit had planted in our hearts. It was then that we began to slowly understand the Lord's heart for the mountain people of Thailand and our role in Missions.

This was my fifth trip to a missions field in Thailand, and my third trip to Chomthong. For each trip, the Lord never fails to teach me something new and inspire me to reach for an even closer relationship with Him. Chomthong 2010 was no different. When I was asked to be the team leader for this trip, I admit that I was



intimidated not only because I had not led a missions team before, but also that half of the team consisted of adults more mature than me (including my own parents), thus the thought of a unified team respecting and submitting to a leader such as myself would indeed be somewhat far-fetched. However, the Lord led me to present all my inadequacies to Him and to trust Him, at the end I told Him "Lord, if you want me to be the team leader, you make a way."

God answered my prayer and opened my eyes to understand that truly nothing is impossible for our God. During the trip, the team epitomised the heart of submissiveness and humility, laying down their rights for God's work to take place. The adults and youth proved to be ever-willing vessels and tools used by the Lord for His purpose and



a great camaraderie developed with God at the centre of it all. By the end of the trip, our missionary contacts were impressed with the team's attitude and even jokingly commented that it was the first time they have not heard Singaporeans complaining! Personally, I felt that I had learnt an invaluable lesson that God wanted to teach me through the example of my own team members. What a blessing!

Be a Blessing, a Bridge and a Catalyst

I came to know the Lord a few months ago, and felt His presence and grace so strong that I was compelled to go on this G1 missions trip to Chomthong, Thailand, to spread the news of His goodness and our salvation.

We met up with Jeph and Apple, the two missionaries who have planted seeds of the gospel among the Karen tribe villages of Nong Lom and Mae Klang Luang up in the hills of northern Thailand. Together, we ministered in the villages through prayer walks and house visitations, where we saw the simple but contented lives of the villagers and their humble livelihoods. We also sensed their desire for faith, healing, and spiritual support. We spent some time with the lovely village children from the

day-care centre in Nong Lom, and the kindergarten in Mae Klang Luang, and prayed that these children would grow up in the ways of the Lord and serve Him by planting more seeds in the land.

In the evenings, we prepared to perform our dance and skits as part of our outreach effort. With God's providence, we experienced no hiccups in setting the stage ready for performances in the villages. The first night at Nong Lom was particularly memorable. Away from home, in the peaceful surroundings of rural Thailand, the night weather was cooling and perfect. We danced and performed for the villagers who sat on straw mats to watch us. We worshipped the Lord and sang hymns, and a local pastor sang them in Thai. I experienced

God in an intimate way, feeling His presence, shutting out the voices of the world, and surrendering my desires and own understanding to the Lord. God impressed upon me His purpose for sending me to the place, that He is using us as a tool to perform His work.

During the altar calls, many of the villagers requested for healing. We knelt and prayed for them, reaching out and opening their hearts to Christ the Lord. We prayed for one girl who could not speak. On the second night that we prayed for her, she opened up and spoke her name. In those few nights, many of the villagers came to accept Christ.

Indeed, God was with us throughout the trip, guiding us in reaching out to the

people despite our language and cultural differences.

Jeph shared that our presence and team spirit brought great encouragement to Apple and himself. As missionaries, they rediscovered the joy, excitement and aggressiveness in spreading the gospel. I realised the importance of support within the Christian community and that even missionaries need the power of fellowship. I saw the unity of the body of Christ, which rightfully should and did transcend man-made borders and cultures.

For the second part of the trip, we went to the heart of Jeph's and Apple's ministry in Chomthong. They run a

home called Hope House for the tribal children who leave their villages for an education in Chomthong. Jeph and Apple have been called by God to minister at Hope House which has to date received 21 children aged 7 to 18. Hope House operates on no promise of income and it is truly God's providence which keeps the ministry alive to be a blessing to the villagers.

The highlights of our stay there included an empowerment camp we conducted for the children, as well as an afternoon of Mini Olympic Games. It was so encouraging to see the children recognising their Father and the Heart of God during the empowerment camp, and having fun running, catching and

getting wet during the team games!

All of us who went on this trip came back with wonderful experiences of God's grace, and I was no exception. As a new believer, I was not sure how I could lead the adult group in devotion on one of the mornings. Most of the other adults were mature Christians who were nurturing their own Christian families. As I prayed and prepared for the devotion, God put into my heart what He wanted me to share. I spoke about the strong foundation, which we all need to build a life in Christ. The assurances of Salvation, Answered Prayer, Victory, Forgiveness and Guidance are the five key areas of our Christian walk. I felt the Holy Spirit leading my words and guiding me in aligning the hearts of the group during the sharing. God's presence was very real and it was such a privilege to me.

Before the trip, I prayed that God would allow me to see His hands at work. Indeed, I saw Him work in each of us to become a blessing to those we visited. I saw His wondrous creation in the hills of Thailand. I saw His providence in Hope House. I saw how prayer is such a powerful tool. I thank God for this trip, for keeping me close to Him, and for allowing me to seek and know Him more.

God's Power at Work in Thailand

Arriving in Thailand for this missions trip, our team was definitely not the most bonded bunch of people sent from PLMC. Most of us were from different services and cell groups, and though we had met for some training sessions, we still did not know each other well. For many of us, it was our first missions trip as well. And unity is surely an integral part of the success of a missions trip. Yet on the return flight to Singapore, no one could possibly deny the success of this trip. So many wonderful things happened, and God really showed His power throughout the trip and in every aspect of our itinerary.

Our leaders, Joshua and Aunty Poh Chean, prepared us well for the food and conditions there, as well as the possibilities for changes in the programme as we went through the trip, so we were anticipating the worst. But God is good. We had few changes to the schedule and the food was fantastic! In the mountain villages of Nong Lom and Mae Klang Luang, He gave us good weather – not too cold to affect our night performances and movie screening.

The days we stayed in the mountain villages were the most interesting for me. Some of us stayed the two nights at Nong Lom in a villager's home. It was too cold to bathe those three days and there were huge spiders in the toilet, but the time we got to spend with that family was special to us, and I believe to



them too. They were very hospitable to us, providing piles of blankets for us to survive the chilly night. It was difficult to communicate with them; none of us knew how to speak the Karen language, and Lena's Thai guidebook offered little help. Even then, when we prayed for them and their house, they

gladly received our prayers in English and prayed for us in their language too. Although we could not understand each other, God's love spoke for us.

We also visited the village kindergartens, where we taught the kids some songs, the English alphabet and numbers.

They seemed to open up and danced with us when we thought them songs with actions and they enjoyed the piggyback rides we gave them, allowing us to interact with them more. I was reminded that despite our different ages, the languages we spoke and customs we embraced, they were a lot like the kids here at Sunday school and they were all Children of God!

The villagers were very open and receptive of our presence there. Besides preparing for us delicious food and being so hospitable to us, they came up for prayers during the altar call. Many of them had knee and back problems or were deaf and mute. One of them was a seven-year-old girl called Annie. She was with some other children near the church the morning we arrived in Nong Lom, and while we were playing with them, one of the village ladies told us that the girl could not speak. That night, after our performance and testimony sharing, the villagers were invited to have the team pray for them. Annie's aunt brought her forward for prayer and Aunty Veron and Aunty Poh Chean prayed for her. The following evening, she was playing with a group of children before dinner. I offered her some sweets and was surprised when she actually spoke to me. Praise the Lord! I realised the power of prayer throughout this



missions trip, but to me, this was a very clear example of it.

Back in Chomthong, we visited some schools, and performed for them there too. We spent the last three days there at Hope House, with the children from the tribal villages whom Arjan Jeph and Apple brought. At Hope House, they are able to attend a nearby school and have an education, which they are not able to if they remained in the village. Besides, they are also taught the Word of God, in the belief that they will return to their villages and spread His message.

We held an empowerment camp for them, with worksheets, activities and even videos. The theme was 'Father Heart of God', and I think that the kids were genuinely impacted by the lessons

as some of them had no parents or strained relationships with them. We also held a 'mini Olympic games' for them and all of us had fun on Christmas day. That night, we had a barbeque and a gift exchange with all the kids, who were very grateful for the presents we got them. They usually have Christmas on a school day, and it was a treat for them to have a celebration.

We went on the missions trip to bless others, but we gained a whole lot ourselves. Personally, this being my first missions trip, I had almost no expectations of what was to come. But this experience was way more than I could ever expect. I saw God's power working as He blessed the people. As a team, we came back united and filled with the desire to return to Thailand.
